

THE VICAR WRITES

When Clergy get together for any length of time they usually end up swapping stories about funerals and some of them are even true. I have given an after dinner speech entirely made up of anecdotes about funerals! This may seem at best a little gloomy and at worst a little tasteless but the stories that clergy swap now are of a different order. For the local vicar, funerals have become very problematical. It is true to say that we are battling (in a very quiet way) for the very existence of a Christian funeral.

There are, of course, many families that opt for a non–religious service and that is an option I completely respect. I have had a limited experience as a mourner at these (as some of my own family have had secular funerals) but they struck me as religious in tone and copy the structure of a Christian funeral – sometimes they include the Lord's Prayer.

The issue now is that a Christian funeral can be so watered down of Christian content that it is often difficult to distinguish it as Christian. For Clergy the main challenge is to have any input in the decisions about the content of the services. Often the undertakers seem to have taken on this role presenting a tick list of options that now include 'music for reflection during the service and the choice of other 'tracks' to be played'. The latest addition to this is to provide digital photographs to be displayed on a screen during the 'service'. I am waiting for the first pre -recorded message from the deceased to be played – it won't be long! It is quiet common now for the funeral to be arranged with a committal of the body before the main service - a funeral without a body.

If you want to know what a Christian funeral looks like have a read of the service registers from St Andrew's Witham on the Hill any time from 1900 to 1945 when Canon Leonard Cooley was the Vicar. This is what happened.

On the night before the funeral, the body would be received into church (usually straight from the family home), there would be a short service of prayer followed by a time for family and friends to sit quietly. (On the rare occasions this happens now I provide the family with a key to the church.) In the morning there would be a service of Holy Communion with a special intention to pray for the soul of the deceased. Later in the day there would be a funeral service and a committal in the churchyard. That is what I call a Christian funeral and I have had enormous privilege of presiding at several of these in my time. There is no substitute for plenty of opportunity for prayer reflection, a careful listening to the message of Christ and a heart felt commendation of the deceased into the hands of God.

Funerals are often traumatic to arrange and often people have said to me ' we wish we had done this or not done that.' It is not the custom these days for people to consult the Parish Priest first about the funeral service. This is a shame because clergy do have a good idea about what helps and what doesn't. If you are pre-paying for a funeral why not have a word with the Vicar before you do? If you have a will why not be specific about the funeral service? One thing is for sure, everyone reading this will have a funeral one

day. I hope and pray that a Christian one will be available in a church somewhere in the vicinity!

CARGE AND

100 years ago this month

(From entries made by the Rev L H Cooley into the Parish Magazine reproduced by kind permission of The Witham on the Hill Historical Society)

<u>June 1917</u>

Our Roll of Honour. - To our list of those who have laid down their lives for King and Country there is now added another name, that of Signaller J. W. *(John William)* Birch, who died of wounds in France on April 29th. William Birch was among the very first of our men to volunteer for service at the outbreak of the war, and enlisted in the Lincolnshire Regt. in September, 1914. He had seen active service since July, 1915, and been previously wounded. A memorial service was held in the church on Sunday, May 13th, which was largely attended by friends and sympathizers. In his address the Vicar alluded to the fact that he was among the first candidates for Confirmation whom he has prepared here, and that, boy and man, he had sung in the choir. He was a good cricketer and took part in several amateur theatricals, and was widely popular in the parish. Our deep sympathies go out to his parents, his young widow, and his family. R.I.P.

A Memorial to the Fallen. - When the war is over, the memory of our heroes must be perpetuated by some enduring memorial, to tell to all future generations the story of their sacrifice. A great Cross - the symbol of sacrifice - standing where all can see it, is the suggestion we venture to make. A beautiful memorial of this nature has recently been erected at Barholm in memory of the late Capt. Lord Kesteven, at the dedication of which the Vicar

was present. Such a memorial we should like to see here, to proclaim to our children's children the glorious story of our heroes.

(Plaque in Barholm church reads: To the beloved memory of Thomas Carew Trollope Bart. 3rd. Baron Kesteven Captain 1/1 Lincolnshire Yeomanry of Casewick Crowcombe and Carew who was born 1st May 1891 and died 5th November 1915 in the French military hospital, Oran, Algiers, from wounds received during the shelling of the transport Mercian by a German submarine in the Mediterranean on 3rd November. The cross in the churchyard is erected by his mother and sister and this memorial by his aunt Geraldine Eleanor Moore. 'For Thine is the kingdom the power and the glory' Audio Sed Taceo)



Exciting new work in diverse media from two well established Lincolnshire artists.

Lyn is well known for her ceramics and in this show there are new sculptural works in clay in addition to pots displaying her love of form.

Her paintings, in acrylic or oil on canvas and her drawings, finely wrought on quality paper, express a subtle use of colour and personal imagery. In contrast, her linocuts, in strong black and white, show a more realistic vision of the countryside inspired by living in Lincolnshire.

Mike produces both two and three dimensional work, preferring to use charcoal for his works on paper, whilst utilising a variety of materials including wood, stone, bone and metal for his sculptures. He likes to use simple shapes to describe and define complex ideas. In addition to the drawings and sculptures he will be taking advantage of the gallery space in Corby Glen to create a large sculptural installation on the theme of Memories. This piece presents objects and drawings in a series of boxes, questioning where the memories actually reside.

There were pictures of Edith Cavell and soldiers in the trenches and contrasting ones of beautiful embroidery saying "Happy Christmas" or "Victorious New Year". Elaine also had a collection of silk hankies and cushions from South Africa and Egypt and pin cushions that were sent home as gifts from the Boer War.

She was very pleased to have found out some social history about an apron owned by her grandmother. The apron was worn in a Great War Fair 1916 – an event that raised £30,000 for wounded soldiers.

Toft cum Lound and Manthorpe Parish Defibrillators

Public Access Defibrillators are installed and ready for use in Manthorpe and Toft.

In Case of Emergency - Dial 999 from a landline or 112 from a mobile.

The ambulance service will know your location from your mobile and will ask you your geographic position from a landline. They will give you the access code to the cabinet if you can assure them that there is at least one other person with the injured person. Enter the code into the keypad and open the door. Take the defibrillator to the emergency.

VERY IMPORTANT

The defibrillator requires no training - all the instructions are given by the machine. Do not wait for one of the 'trained' residents to come and assist -

TAKE THE INITIATIVE AND FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS - YOU CANNOT GO WRONG!

Defibrillator Training - It has been suggested that there may be a need for a repeat training session on how easy it is to use this potentially life-saving equipment. Asparagus has a mild delicate flavour, and is one of the first fresh spring vegetables after all the root veg of the winter. I was given several bundles of asparagus, which has a very short season, so I made a batch of soup for the freezer, and a couple of asparagus guiches.

ASPARAGUS SOUP

1 large onion

25g butter

500g asparagus

2 medium potatoes

2 pints chicken stock

2 tablespoons double cream

Melt the butter in a saucepan, add finely chopped onion and cook gently over a low heat until softened, but not brown. Cut off the woody ends of the asparagus, and chop the long thin spears into chunks. Add to the pan and cook gently. Peel & dice the potatoes & add to asparagus. Pour in hot chicken stock (for vegetarians use vegetable stock) and simmer for 20 mins. Whizz with a stick blender until smooth. To serve stir in double cream.
