



The Vicar Writes

Running (jogging) isn't something that comes naturally or easily to me. It was around 2011 that I first started. My daughter, Jessica. attended Tollbar Academy in Grimsby and if you look it up on Google Maps (or even in a proper map) you'll see that the school is situated at the bottom of an inverted triangle-shaped island created by Waltham / Grimsby road and the A1234. This means that you can run around it on the pavement like a track circuit. I'd noticed that it was a favourite for local joggers and, to my wife's astonishment, I started to try and run around it. Truth be told, it was only about four kilometres - but initially it felt like miles! My first attempts required three stops along the way to recover and regain my breath. I recall with great pride the first time I managed to get all the way around without stopping (something I thought was akin to the 'training montages' from the Rocky films). In the months that followed my progress was slow but steady and eventually I added to the length of my runs, bought a pair of proper running shoes and ditched my bobbly tracksuit bottoms for proper shorts and a running top. I managed to get up to regular runs of ten miles and

completed the Humber Half-Marathon twice.

I'd love to say that I 'caught the running bug' but, in all honesty, it still takes a lot to get me out of the house and out on the road. The essential ingredients for me are the route and what I've decided to listen to along the way. I can't run without listening to something. It doesn't have to be music (although I've noticed that music makes me run faster). When I first started running I decided to revisit audio versions of the classic novels I failed to read properly for A Level English. Before long I (re)discovered Thomas Hardy, Anthony Trollope and D H Lawrence thanks to the iTunes podcast library and the Librivox app on my phone (highly recommended!). One way or another, be it music or words, I have to lose myself in order to be able to run; something has to guide me and take me on a journey away from the often painful reality of the exercise. The route is equally important. I can't just run from one point to another. There has to be a sense of progress, some varied scenery and the option of staying on to do another circuit (this was what helped me to move up from five miles to ten).

If I were to choose the most satisfying aspect of starting to run it wouldn't be that I lost a bit of weight, felt fitter or that my body shape improved (vanity, vanity all is vanity!). The most satisfying thing was that I was approaching my forties and I'd managed to do something that was out of character (no one saw it coming) and that it undeniably added value to my life. When I trained for the Priesthood I lived alongside the monastic community at Mirfield in West Yorkshire and I remember them saving that they were reluctant to take new novices over the age of fifty because, by that time, they would be set in their ways and would lack the capacity for their lives to be radically reshaped. Lacking the capacity to change for the better was something I feared. The idea of being so set in my ways that I couldn't change my life for the better terrified me. It reminded me of the famous quote by John Henry Newman, "To live is to change, and to change often is to become more perfect" (Conscience, Consensus, and the Development of Doctrine). I don't think Newman was suggesting that we should live in a constant state of flux, but rather that we should never be so content with our present selves to the point where

we think that there's no point in trying to make things better.

There are many and varied things out there that might inspire us to make a major change in our lives. It could be health concerns; we might be stirred by the plight of others or even by politics. The capacity of faith to inspire and cultivate change never ceases to amaze me. I would even go as far as to suggest that faith often seems to inspire change more than facts. Facts seem so easily dismissed these days whereas faith seems to motivate us from deep within and, once it's got a hold of us, it rarely lets us go. A great deal of change has been inspired by the great outpouring of the Holy Spirit that we celebrate each year at Pentecost. Such was for the force of the empowerment and motivation that proceeded forth from the Father and the Risen and Ascended Son, that cowards now preached with conviction and many went on to give their lives in witness to what God had done in Jesus.

Bishop Norman will be joining us this year at Pentecost (9th June) for a group service at Edenham. He never fails to inspire and is someone who radiates positivity. My prayer, my

Witham on the Hill Parish Meeting Chairman's Report – 20th May 2019 A big thank you to all Councillors for their support during the last year.

Also, thanks to Parishioners for their continued public-spirited help with keeping the area around the old stocks and the Bywells tidy. In particular, Frances Plummer, Gloria Greenwood and Jason Beedell along with members of the Parish Council, who have given up their time to do the work. In particular I would like to thank Matt Dick for the magnificent new oak handrail which he fabricated and installed single handed and at his own cost. The Bywells is an area where attention will need to be focused in the coming years as the watercourse is badly in need of repair if it is to function properly and the roof over the stocks will also need work in due course.

A number of planning applications were discussed during the year, although happily, none were considered to be contentious.

Last year the Parish Council resolved to see what could be done to improve the play equipment and seating on the village green. Thanks to a generous grant from the Mick George Fund and kind donations from Witham Hall School and Suzy Grigson, the Parish Council were able to fund the work. This was completed in February and included the installation of new play equipment, upgrading and rearrangement of the existing layout, so that particularly the younger children are now better provided for. There are also two new benches one of which has seating adapted for disabled access. Particular thanks must go to Cllr Lynne O'Hara for coordinating the grant application, donations and appointment of the contractor, so that the works could be done.

The Parish Council has continued to lobby for improvement works to the A6121 via Cllr Bob Adams, Lincolnshire County Council. The particular concern is the crossroads at the foot of the hill, where accidents are still occurring on a regular basis. The Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership has been contacted to raise concerns and suggest remedial measures, but continuing budget restrictions are frustrating any real progress.

The footpaths in and around the village are generally being maintained to a good standard and a new bridge has been erected over the stream at the bottom of Church field which is a big improvement on the old one. The

cooperation of local landowners is much appreciated as always.

In order to keep Parishioners better informed it has been suggested that a group email be organised for this purpose and a leaflet explaining the benefits and who is to coordinate this will be distributed in the next few weeks.

Charles Henriques Chair: Witham on the Hill Parish Council

Witham on the Hill Parish Council Minutes

Present: Councillors: Charles Henriques, Andrew Greenwood, Janet Kirkwood, Lynne O'Hara and Sue Pennant Jones.

Residents: None Others: Bernard Champness – Clerk, County Cllr Bob Adams and District Cllr Christopher Benn.

Cllr Henriques was nominated and elected as Chair for the forthcoming year.

Cllr Greenwood was nominated and elected as Vice Chair for the forthcoming year.

It was reported that the matting around the recently installed play equipment had been damaged by the grass cutter; Cllr O'Hara will contact SKDC to arrange repair.

Cllr Greenwood said the Bywells watercourse was leaking with water draining away through the sides. Sealing with clay was a potential remedy and it was suggested the leakage may be responsible for the subsidence in Bottom St. It was decided to maintain a watching brief for the moment until a more organised approach to the problem could be initiated.

Cllr Bob Adams was advised that we were still anxious for something to be done to make the crossroads on the A6121 safer; the illuminated speed sign was now working.

The PC expressed its wish to continue to lobby for road markings and for speed restrictions, because of the numbers of children crossing the road at this junction. Cllr Adams explained that he was hoping to arrange for someone from the Road Safety Partnership to come and view the problem themselves at peak time.

Also mentioned was, getting the footpath from the village to the crossroads cleaned and cleared of spreading vegetation as children who have to walk to the crossroads to catch the bus to school are forced because of the vegetation, to walk into the road, which was dangerous.

The footpath could not be cleaned under the SKDC Big Clean initiative as it was outside the village. Both Cllrs Adams and Benn said that they would look further into this matter to establish how this work could be done.

A Street lighting fault between 8 and 9 East Green has now been reported.

There were no planning applications to consider.

Local Elections - 2nd May 2019: The following Councillors were re-elected at the recent non-contested elections; Mrs P Cranfield, Mrs A Whadcock, Mr R Biggs, Mr A Martin, Mr A Wilson and Mr T Clarke. This left 1 vacancy which was filled at the meeting by the co-option of Mr D Bradley, Scottlethorpe Road, Edenham. Councillors completed acceptance of office and Declaration of Interest forms. Cllr R Biggs was elected as Chairman and Cllr P Cranfield as Vice Chair for the forthcoming year.

33 mph. The radar can be activated by a large vehicle, (bus lorries, and the like) up to a distance of 100 metres, smaller vehicles, (Cars, Vans, motor bikes etcetera) up to 40/50 metres.

Positioning - The manufacturers suggest two locations for the unit. First, the entrance to a town or village. The rationale here is to advise approaching vehicles they are about to enter a 30 mph speed limit. The onus is on the driver to reduce their speed so that, by the time they reach the 30 mph limit, they are entering our village at the correct speed. In these locations you can expect the unit to activate many times.

The second location should be within 100 metres (inside) of the entrance of the village. Here the rationale is to notify drivers they are exceeding the designated speed limit, this should encourage them to brake accordingly. If a speed camera were in the High Street and a vehicle were travelling at 30mph + 10% + 2mph = 35mph, the camera would activate, and the driver would receive a nasty brown envelope through their letter box.

This is a portable unit; therefore it can be located in a number of positions in and around the Village, it is early days yet, you will see the speed sign placed in various locations, the three main entrances to the Village, the High Street and Bourne Road. This is a work in progress.

Correspondence Received:

The Clerk advised the councillors of an email received from The Salvation Army, requesting the possibility of siting a Clothing recycling bank in the village. This was discussed, the consensus of the council was, there was not an appropriate location for the clothing bank. Parish Clerk to respond to the Salvation Army.

The Clerk read out an email from SJR Contractors Ltd, (Following the meeting with Cllr Cowan). The Councillors felt the response was concise, however, it did not address the issues of speeding vehicles, as such the

 Parish Council will continue to liaise with the haulage companies.

A planning application notification re amendments to plots 7 & 8 Macham Close was received. The amendments were not obvious on the notification, as such, Chairman Paul Cunningham will contact the Planning office to discuss the amendments with the planning case officer, then advise the Parish Councillors prior to representations or approval.

A letter was received from the St Marys Parochial Church Council asking if the Parish Council are able to give a donation to help with the upkeep of the Churchyard.

After discussion a proposal for a donation of £350 was made by Cllr Lynch, this was seconded by Cllr Darling.

Children's Play Area:

The issue of a children's play area was raised by Cllr Dermody to consider the installation, cost and feasibility for a play area on the Green at Croake Hill.

After discussion, the Parish Clerk is to speak with District Cllr Nick Robins regarding any covenants, also to contact the Muire Housing Association re a play area.

AOB:

Cllr Dermody asked if the Parish Council will look at the cost of planting Spring bulbs at the three main entrances to the Village, also to look into the feasibility of an illuminated Christmas tree for the festive season. (Both issues to be added to the agenda for the next PC meeting.)

Jane's seasonal recipe

Have you got lots of rhubarb in the garden and are fed up with rhubarb crumble? Try these for a change!

Rhubarb & custard muffins

300g rhubarb

50g caster sugar

140g soft light brown sugar

75ml sunflower oil

1 egg

Zest of 1 orange

284 ml carton soured cream

300g sr flour

8 tablespoons thick devon custard (from a carton) chilled

Cut rhubarb into 1inch lengths, toss in caster sugar, put in roasting tin, cover in foil & roast 200c for 15 mins until tender. Cool & drain. Beat oil, brown sugar, egg, zest & sour cream until combined. Mix in flour, & fold in rhubarb. Divide ¾ mixture into 12 muffin cases, make a dip in the centre, fill each with a small blob of custard. Cover with the rest of the muffin mix. Bake at 180c for 25 mins until risen & golden. Sprinkle with caster sugar. Best eaten same day.

APOLOGIES for an error in a recipe printed in May 2017 edition of the Three Towers. I know that some readers save the recipes, so I do hope it hasn't caused too much trouble. The recipe was for Blackberry crumble bars; and should have read "press **half** the mixture into the tin".
