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The Vicar Writes

For as long as I can remember, there has been a difference of opinion as to the correct response to the traditional prayer that's offered in the Vestry after the Sunday Parish Eucharist. The prayer, as some of you may know, is as follows:

V. The Lord be with you**R. and also with you.**V. Let us bless the Lord.**R. Thanks be to God.**

May the Divine Assistance remain with us always, and may the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace...

To which some respond: "And rise in glory!" whereas others say only "Amen!"

'Well, what's the difference?' you might think. The difference is what each of the two possible responses says about bodies. You see, souls don't rise in glory (or least they cannot without a body to accompany them). Let me explain! Christianity, in stark contrast to the ancient Greek world, has a very high view of the body. In spite of their reputation for revelry, the ancient Greeks had a very negative view of their physical

selves with one of their more popular proverbs declaring that "The body is a tomb." So perhaps it's no accident that the Greek word for "body" (soma) is very similar to the word (sēma) meaning "tomb".

For the ancient Greeks, the body was, guite literally, a prison; a vessel that oppressed and incarcerated the soul and consequently, salvation meant an escape from the limits of bodily existence. To be free was to be rid of the body once and for all and to live in a state that was purely spirit. It's a view that is contrary to Christianity and one that undervalues God's purpose in material creation and yet it's one that we're never very far from. In a Bible Study that I hosted several years ago, one lady was most alarmed to discover that, ultimately, her body would be reunited with her soul at the Resurrection of the Dead. "It's given me so much jip" she said "I was looking forward to being rid of it!"

You really don't have to travel a great distance to find people who are dissatisfied with their bodies in one way or another. There are those who want to change the way they look, those who are unhappy with their physical capabilities and those who feel trapped in the wrong body altogether. Most people seem to

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carry on regardless with the body they've been given, but I think all of us would have one or two things on our list if we could change anything we wanted to about our own bodies.

The feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (15th August) emphasises the importance of the body (whatever shape, size or capacity) to our Christian faith. In his first letter to the Christian community in Corinth. St Paul reminds us of Christ's victory over death and we, in turn, must remember that, having conquered death, Jesus rose victorious from the tomb with a transformed and risen body. He wasn't a disembodied spirit, a ghost or a spectre for he showed the disciples the wounds on his physical body and he shared real, everyday food with them on several occasions. However, it was also clear that all wasn't exactly as it had been! The difference was that in his resurrection, Jesus set aside the perishable nature of the human body and put on the immortal nature of the Godhead as the promise of what's to come for those who put their hope and trust in him. For, as the Funeral Service reminds us, Christ's saving death will 'transform our frail bodies, that they may be conformed to his glorious body'. And

because the Virgin Mary was considered to be free from original sin, so she was able to share immediately in the victory of her Son over sin and death! She was 'assumed' into heaven body and soul. The Eucharistic Preface for the Assumption describes this as "the beginning...the pattern of the Church in its perfection" and "a sign of hope and comfort". In her Assumption, Mary becomes for the Church a sign of what awaits us all. Where she has gone, we will follow – body and soul.

It's a sad reality that society seems ever ready to deny even the basic dignity of human beings made in the image of God these days. While the ever more real threat of environmental catastrophe reminds us of our failure to appreciate, care for and maintain God's physical and material Creation around us. Yet the feast of the Assumption can give us great hope and comfort, not only for ourselves but for the world in general. For not only does the Virgin Mary's Assumption confirm the promise of our own final destiny, it should also inspire us to value and care for all God's people and for his wonderful creation, for it teaches us that ultimately, like Mary, 'we' and 'it' (physical and spiritual) will one day be transformed by God's glory



and come to our ultimate perfection in Christ.

So...

May the Divine Assistance remain with us always, and may the souls and bodies of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace... and rise in glory! Amen.

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SWINSTEAD PARISH COUNCIL

Clerk's Notes of the meeting of the Parish Council held at 18.30 on Thursday 11th July 2019

Present: Chairman, Paul Cunningham, Vice Chair Cllr M Dermody, Cllr C Lunn, Cllr B Lynch, Cllr D Darling, C Hatch (Clerk) Invited Guests: County Councillor Bob Adams, District Councillor Nick Robbins.

Public Forum: One member of the public attended the forum. The resident asked if a play area for children could be made available on the green area of Croake Hill. The council advised this was on the agenda for discussion.

Apologies for absence: None

Receive declarations of interest under the Localism Act 2011: None **Minutes of the Previous Meeting:** The Minutes of the previous meeting held on the 9th May were agreed as an accurate record and signed.

Clerk & Financial Report: The Clerk delivered the financial report to the council, a copy of which is available from the Clerk. He advised that he and the Chairman had attended a Parish Council Networking training day which proved to be very informative. He also advised on the forthcoming Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils AGM on the 15th October and a "New Councillors Training Evening " on the 18th September, encouraging all new councillors to attend.

An issue has arisen regarding the ownership of the green area at the front of Croake Hill. SKDC say it has been cutting the grass in error as it does not own the land. The Clerk is in discussion with Muir Housing and SKDC to establish ownership. In the meantime, the Parish Council will assume responsibility until a decision has been made.

The Clerk advised that a meeting has been arranged with Historic England to discuss restoration work on the Swinstead Butter Cross. The meeting is to be held on the 12th July @ 11am





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Finally, the relocation of the Speed Sign to the High Street was discussed. Since it was located in the High Street eleven days ago, it has been activated on 675 occasions. This means 675 vehicles have been travelling in excess of 35mph through the village. The sign will remain in the High Street until the end of July, then be re-located in Bourne Road. The Clerk to advise the Parish Council of the results at the September meeting.

Chairman's Report: The Chairman advised that a resident had raised concerns regarding alleged soil contamination and breach of Planning Rules in relation to the building work at Macham Close. These concerns have been passed to District Cllr Robins who will look into these alleged breaches and pass details on to the Planning Enforcement Office to investigate further.

The Chairman discussed an email and photographs received from a resident in New Estate, regarding problems with flooding at the bottom of road, making access to her property difficult. County Councillor Bob Adams also attended the meeting asked the Chairman for the details and confirmed he will pass the details to the Highways engineers and ask them to investigate.

Children's Play Area: The consensus of the Parish Council is to support a children's play area on the green at Croake Hill. The Chairman and Clerk had spoken with suppliers of play equipment at the Networking day they attended. They were advised by these companies, they can help with supply, design and advise on funding. The Parish Council has to confirm there are no covenants on the land preventing this type of activity. The Parish Clerk is pursuing this enquiry and will keep the Council updated.

Community Fridge: The consensus of the Council was, they are not able to support this idea due to issues relating to Health and Safety, ownership, location and hygiene. A suggestion was that social media could play a valuable part, advertising a surplus of perishable and non-perishable foods to anyone who can make use of them, before they are disposed of or composted.

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Jubilee Orchard: Cllr Lunn & Cllr Lynch requested the replacement of ten new fruit trees that had perished due to the very hot summer last year. This request was agreed and prices to be obtained later in the year, closer to the time of planting.

Traffic – Speeding concerns: Cllr Robins congratulated the Parish Council on the efforts being made to control the speed of traffic. He told us about a system of monitoring vehicles, number of vehicles, speed etc, that may help the Council with decision-making for future speed related projects. Parish Clerk to contact the monitoring company.

Flower Planters and Bulbs: The placement of Flower Planters (tubs) and flowering spring bulbs at the three entrances to the village was discussed. Cllr Dermody advised 1500 Daffodil bulbs can be purchased at a cost of £120 and would require planting in late August. This was agreed. (Look out for a call for volunteers later in the year)

Quotes are to be obtained from three reputable companies for flower planters.

Parish Council Marketing/PR: The Chairman, aware that not all residents have access to social media, suggested producing a short but informative Newsletter, "Your Council Working For You", to be delivered to all homes in the village, once every two to three month, providing information of events in the village, decisions passed by the council, contact details for your Parish Councillors, enabling you to raise any question, concerns or compliments for the Public Forum if you are not able to attend the Parish Council Meeting. This idea was accepted and will now be put into action.

Any Other Business: Cllr Darling suggested a late summer picnic be held in the Jubilee Orchard. Fun & Games for the children and their family. (To be discussed at the EGM)

Cllr Lunn advised his concerns and observations of unwanted activity in the Church and Church yard, mainly, dog fouling in the Church yard, young boys playing with skate boards in the Church yard and potential damage to the carpet inside the church, which had been rucked up and moved after the church doors were closed for the night.

The carpet, a gift to Lady Jane Willoughby, by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth came from Westminster Abbey following her Coronation. The carpet is not only a piece of English Heritage but also our local history and irreplaceable. Any person caught would be charged with criminal damage.

To reiterate, dogs are not to be walked or exercised in the church yard, (as per the sign at the entrance to the church). The church yard is not to be used as a play or recreation area.

Swinstead has the smartest, tidiest church yard in the area. If you enter the church or church yard, please afford it the respect it deserves.

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100 years ago this month

(From entries made by the Rev L H Cooley into the Parish Magazine—reproduced by kind permission of The Witham on the Hill Historical Society)

August 1919

Thanksgiving for Peace. In accordance with the Royal Proclamation, Sunday, July 6th was solemnly observed as the Nation's day of thanksgiving to Almighty God for Peace, and our own services were beautiful and inspiring, though it is difficult to account for the frame of mind which could keep anyone from the House of God on this historic day.

Peace rejoicings.- The secular rejoicings took place on Saturday. July, 19th. A sumptuous meat tea for all our soldiers, old people and children was provided at the expense of the committee, and ably managed by many willing and kind helpers. After tea came the rain, which however proved quite unavailing to damp our enjoyment, and the Squire opened the music room at the Hall for dancing during the showers. Sports followed, and the programme concluded with a fine display of fireworks and a gigantic bonfire, which must have been plainly visible

even from distant Peterborough and almost as conspicuous as our recent searchlight, which used to flash skywards from the same spot.

In Memoriam, John R. Lound. - The sad intelligence of the death of Private John Lound, came as a great shock to us all. Little did we think that we should have to mourn the death of still another of our soldier boys, now that the war is over. It appears that in crossing a recent battlefield in France he was instantaneously killed by the bursting of a live shell which lay on the ground. Although his home was at Caythorpe, we have looked upon John Lound quite as one of our own boys ever since he came to live with Mr. Wilcox as his assistant more than 4 years ago. He attached himself from the very first to the church, where he was an ardent and devoted ringer. Here he was confirmed in 1916, and here he has ever since been a regular worshipper and communicant. Since he was called up for military service, the Vicar used to hear from him continually, his last letter came only a few days before his death. In every letter he expressed his intense longing to be back at Witham, and exhorted us to "carry on" with the bells until his return. On the Sunday following the Vicar spoke of his death and the



sorrow and sympathy which it had called forth, and a muffled peal was rung in his memory. His parents have now lost three sons through this cruel war. R.I.P. (*He was the last to join up in summer 1918*)

offer our deepest sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. James Holmes in the tragic loss of their eldest son. Mr Graham Holmes, recently demobilized, came home for a visit on Saturday, August 2nd, to meet his two brothers, and was taken ill on the following day. On the Monday, the doctor advised his removal to the Butterfield Hospital *(in North Street, Bourne)*, where he died on the Friday. His death was undoubtedly hastened by the effects of gas-poisoning, which he had experienced whilst on foreign service. When a boy, Graham Holmes was a most valued member of the choir, and also a server at the Altar. It was therefore eminently fitting that his body should rest in the church where he had so often ministered, and that the burial office should be choral, R.I.P.

Mr and Mrs. Holmes beg to thank all the many friends who have shown such kindness and sympathy with them in their sad bereavement.

Initial comments about confusion of proposed site location detailed on limited enclosed paperwork. Formal planning application via SKDC is underway which will clarify location and full details of the site etc so that a full assessment can be made by the council.

Cllr Wilson reported that the play surface at the children's play area has been damaged during last playing field grass cutting. Installation contractor to be contacted to assess situation.

Cllr Biggs reported that the recent 'Baston Car & Bike Show' held at Grimsthorpe Castle had been a great success and that the traffic management had worked very well with little disruption to local traffic. Cllr M Hill(LCC) gave a brief update on Lincolnshire County Council, with the Rural Fare Share Funding campaign for rural councils still being lobbied at Central Government, although the 'Brexit' situation was delaying progress.

Cllr N Robins(SKDC) reported that he has taken over the portfolio for Planning and Planning Policy, where a review of the planning system is to take place; the new cinema in Grantham is to open on the 19th July; and the council are striving to deliver projects that are underway and develop future projects to improve services etc.

Local Crime. Parishioners are reminded to be observant in their local area and pass on any details of suspicious vehicles or activities that you see to the Police on their 101 tel no.

Highways: Lincolnshire County Council Website (https:// www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/) holds a lot of information on Lincolnshire Highways such as planned works/ road closure etc along with an online defect reporting system that anyone can use to report things such as potholes, damaged road signs, street lighting faults (please use website especially for potholes!!). There is also an App for your mobile called '**FixMyStreet**' available , which allows a report to include photos and location data to be input prior to sending to Highways Dept.

Jane's seasonal recipe

This is a quick & easy recipe that I adapted from a Lidl magazie, based on a spicy West African recipe. With tomatoes and peppers from our greenhouse and courgettes in the garden, this is ideal for a last minute supper dish.

Chicken jollof traybake

8 chicken thighs 1 tablespoon oil 1 onion 1 red pepper 1 red chilli 1 teaspoon paprika 400ml tin chopped tomatoes 600ml chicken stock 1 courgette 200g mixed colour cherry tomatoes 300g basmati rice

Arrange chicken in a large roasting tray, bake at 200c for 15 mins. Fry sliced onion & pepper in oil for 5 mins. Stir in chopped chilli & paprika, fry for 2 mins. Add chopped tomatoes & stock. Pour the pepper sauce around the thighs, add rice & stir well. Add sliced courgettes, & cherry tomatoes, ensuring chicken is uncovered. Roast for 40 mins until chicken is golden & the rice is cooked.
