

The Vicar Writes Grantchester or Bust

Whenever I'm out and about on Sundays driving between services or off to do home communions, I usually encounter a good number of cyclists along the way. Most, if not all, are kitted out with modern lightweight bikes, sunglasses, and brightly coloured lycra outfits. I don't think I would be speaking out of turn if I were to suggest that cycling these days has more to do with exercise and fitness than to the need to cycle to school, work or even to the shop for bread or milk. But that is exactly what I miss. I run for exercise and I cycle for pleasure. One is a hit-and-miss attempt at staying fit and losing weight, the other is to enjoy again the sense of freedom and fun that I first tasted when the stabilizers came off aged four-and-a-half.

I stumbled back into cycling just before the first lockdown when

a 1950s American made Raleigh Speed Rat came my way. After that I soon discovered that even earlier bikes were still available in workable condition on Facebook Marketplace or eBay for as little as f20. Before too long I'd picked up a handful of bikes ranging from the 1930s to 1960 and, with the help of someone in the know from Bourne, returned them to working order. A favourite soon emerged in the form of a 1960 Hercules complete with a shopping basket on the front. It had been languishing in the back garden of a chap in Cambridge who kept it as his 'pub bike'. It was the most comfortable of all the bikes to ride and the basket gave me the opportunity to offer to drop by the Co-op as justification for popping out on a quick bike ride (once you get a bike with a basket, you'll never look back).

Characteristically, my imagination began to get the better of me and I started



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dreaming of cycling adventures beyond the odd trip out to Morton or Market Deeping. I'd long been a fan of the Grantchester TV series but reserved my true affection for the books written by James Runcie (son of Robert Runcie the former Archbishop of Canterbury). Vintage bicycles occasionally featured in the ITV adaptation, and I began to picture riding my favourite bike out to Cambridge and beyond to Grantchester itself. A quick glimpse at Google Maps suggested that a varied and scenic route of sixty-one miles was possible. However, before my aspiration got the better of me, I soon realised that I'd need help. Aspiration is nothing without practical ability and when it comes to mending punctures or putting chains back on my ability is sadly lacking. Fortunately, my dad and his wife Barbara came to the rescue and offered to meet me along the way in their campervan, to help if I got into

trouble and to carry a spare bike (just in case).

We fixed the date for Friday 2nd September to coincide with the annual Lincolnshire Churches Trust Ride and Stride and to provide a valuable opportunity to raise funds both for the Parishes and for LCT. A new helmet, hi-vis vest, battery powered pump, two different puncture repair kits and a pair of well-padded cycling shorts were purchased and a set-off time of 8am agreed. According to the Google Maps cycle route the journey was likely to take five and a half hours. I added five planned stops along the way (including at least one visit to Starbucks).

Twelve miles in I made my first stop at Willow Brook Farm Shop for a cuppa. The legs were feeling fine and I resisted my father's kind offer to stop for a full (veggie) breakfast (another time perhaps?). Next up, I passed through Ailsworth and left Dad and Barbara behind as I

disappeared along the cycle path into Nene Park and then making my way through various housing estates and avoiding the Peterborough traffic. It had only been six miles since my first stop and it felt a little indulgent calling in at Starbucks on Paxton Road but I was making good time and felt like I could miss the next scheduled stop and push on. After passing through Orton Southgate industrial estate, I was out onto New Road which ran parallel to the A1. Some miles later I passed by RAF Alconbury and into Stukeley Country. Huntingdon proved a little tricky as the route asked me to take the pavement in the opposite direction along a oneway street (!) but after Godmanchester the terrain opened and I found myself ambling through a nature reserve, crossing the Great Ouse at the lock before Houghton Mill before a final rendezvous at the Cattle Market Carpark in St Ives and a well-earned sandwich before pushing on towards

Cambridge. The way to Cambridge lay along the NCN51 Busway; a set of concrete tracks stretching for miles and providing a direct route for buses into Cambridge. The walking and cycle path was clearly popular with plenty of people out in the summer sunshine. It did dawn on me though that with no other vehicular access possible on the Busway, a puncture at this point would really scupper things. It was also around this time that my legs and back began to complain and the monotony of a seemingly dead straight path began to wear me down a little. At last, I emerged into the village of Impington Mill and made a necessary stop at a shop for some Lucozade and Ibuprofen. The lady behind the counter saw my bike and the way I was dressed (cycling shorts and a clerical shirt and collar) and asked what I was doing. I explained the whole thing and she kindly announced, "No charge!" for the drink and

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tablets (thank you).

As I left Cambridge behind, and Grantchester drew ever nearer Dad called to say that he thought a wedding was taking place at the Church of St Andrew and St Mary (my final destination). He let me know that he had parked the campervan at a carpark just outside the village and that Barbara would meet me near the Church. As the Church came into view, I quickly realised that it wasn't a wedding taking place, they were filming outside the nearby Vicarage for the Grantchester television series! There was Tom Brittney (the star of the show as Rev Will Davenport) receiving the attention of makeup artists before filming a scene three or four times in which he sat smoking a cigarette on the steps of the Vicarage before a schoolboy ran down the garden path to show him a letter. I couldn't quite believe it. This was the reason I had chosen



Grantchester as my destination and here it was being filmed! Never one to pass up an opportunity, I enquired if Tom would mind posing for a quick photo and twenty minutes later, he popped over and kindly obliged. He was a true gent and when I later tagged him on Instagram (as you do), he



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returned the favour and wrote "Great to meet you! And congratulations on the 61 mile cycle! (on a 1960's bike nonetheless). From one fake vicar to a real one."

Meeting Tom really was the icing on the cake of a most enjoyable day. In the end it took just under seven hours with four stops (and no punctures). I would never have got there without the help and encouragement of Dad and Barbara. In the end we raised just over £700. I'm already plotting my next adventure. Perhaps I should head to Pinewood Studios? It's only one hundred and sixteen miles from Edenham...

A MESSAGE FROM OUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR PENNY ROBINS

South Kesteven District Council (SKDC) is taking steps to provide support for those living in South Kesteven who are struggling with the cost of living. The Flodden Plaque

The small village of Tickencote lies in the east of the county of Rutland, two miles north-west of Stamford. The village is mentioned in the Domesday Book of 1086 with the Countess Judith of Lens, a niece of William the Conqueror, listed as Tenant-in-Chief. From the 17th century the Lordship of the Manor was held by the Wingfield family. The first of that name was John Wingfield who moved into Tickencote Hall in 1602 with his wife Elizabeth. John originated from the Suffolk branch of the family who came from the village of Wingfield in Suffolk. They in turn descended from Sir Henry Wingfield of Letheringham, also in Suffolk. The Tickencote Wingfields were great benefactors of the local church, financing its restoration in 1792.

For such a small village to have a church at all is surprising. What is even more remarkable is that the church is exceptionally fine with superb architectural features. The massive Norman chancel arch is rightly regarded as the finest in England, the stunning rib vault in the chancel is certainly



unique in the country and there is a 600 year old wooden recumbent effigy, sadly now showing its age. For these features alone the church is well worth a visit.

Easily overlooked amongst these attractions is a small oak plaque on the south wall of the nave. Inset into the plaque is a brass tablet commemorating the death of Sir Anthony, one of the Suffolk Wingfields, who was killed at the battle of Flodden in 1513. The brass tablet reads, in translation from the old northern English:

"At Flodden field did bravely fight and die, Of Wingfield sons, the brave Sir Anthony, But death he counted much gain since he, Over the Scot did gain the victory".

The inscription on the oak plaque reads:

"The above was given to this church in 1938 by John Parry Wingfield. It was probably first fixed in Letheringham church in Suffolk. The battle was fought on the 9th September 1513".

According to the Church guide book, the brass tablet was found in a shop in Lowestoft in 1862.

The battle of Flodden was fought in Northumberland. King Henry VIII was in



France having joined the Holy League formed by Pope Julius II fighting against French territorial ambitions in Europe, leaving the defence of England in the hands of the 70 year old Thomas Howard, Earl of Surrey.

King James IV of Scotland was obliged by a mutual defence treaty with the French to invade northern England. He raised an army of 30,000 men including the flower of the Scottish nobility and marched south from Edinburgh crossing the English border at the River Tweed.

The Earl of Surrey mobilised 26,000 men at his base at Pontefract Castle and then marched north to Wooler in Northumberland. Surrey was concerned that the Scots might retreat back across the border from their impregnable position on Flodden Edge, a hill 500 feet high.

Surrey and his entire army undertook a daring march in foul weather to outflank the Scots and deployed to the north of the Scottish position. The English had cut off King James's supply line and his retreat to Scotland, leaving him no option but to fight.

A bloody battle ensued, with cannon fire, volley after volley of deadly arrows and vicious hand to hand fighting. The Scottish army was eventually destroyed, King James was killed, the last king in Britain to fall in battle, along with twelve earls, fourteen lords, at least one member of every leading Scottish family and 10,000 of her soldiers. The English lost no more than 1500 men.

There is a handsome memorial cross, erected in 1910, at the site of the battle with an inscription:

"Flodden 1513. To the brave of both nations."

There is a memorial window in St. Leonard's Church in Middleton, Lancashire, commemorating the archers of Middleton who fought so valiantly under Sir Richard Assheton in Sir Edward Stanley's division of the English army. The window is claimed to be the oldest war memorial in England. Perhaps the Flodden Plaque in Tickencote Church, Rutland, can challenge this assertion?

A visit to the battlefield at Flodden is highly recommended. An equal recommendation can be made for Tickencote Church, which has the benefit of being much nearer. Prepare to be amazed by the chancel arch and the rib vaulting, but spare a glance for the Flodden Plaque and spare a thought for those brave men of long ago.

Jane's Seasonal Recipe

This is a recipe from a Waitrose newspaper. At the time of going to print, I haven't actually made them, so I do hope they are ok! We have parsnips in the garden and intend to dig up the first ones in a few days, so I look forward to trying out this recipe. Let me know what you think of them.

Parsnip & Parmesan Scones

320g sr flour 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp dried sage 75g butter 1 large parsnip 30g parmesan ½ teaspoon wholegrain mustard 150ml milk 1 egg

Mix flour, baking powder and sage in a large bowl. Rub in butter to make fine breadcrumbs. Stir in coarsely grated parsnips and 25g finely grated parmesan. Mix mustard with milk, stir into flour with a round bladed knife, combining well. Tip dough onto a floured board, bring together and roll out to 2.5cm thick. Use a 5cm cutter to cut 15 scones. Put on a baking sheet, brush with beaten egg and scatter over remaining parmesan. Bake at 220°C for 12-15 mins until risen and golden. Serve warm, spread with butter.
