The Vicar Writes

How far back can you trace your family tree? For some of us it's centuries and for others it's decades. Until recently my awareness of my own Martin family history was a little sketchy. My father was born and raised near St Helen's in Lancashire (where his grandparents and great grandparents also lived). He had some idea that our family might have had roots further south, perhaps even as far south as Cornwall and that previous generations may have been involved in working on railways or building canals. One clue that my father occasionally mentioned was an engraved purse that had been awarded to a Martin family member in the late 1800s and that was still in our possession. The only problem was that we didn't know who or which Martin had been the recipient of the award – it didn't say! All that the inscription told us was the following:

"PRESENTED BY Evan Pateshall Esq MP on behalf of the Hereford District AOF with 30 sovereigns to Brother Martin as a token of sympathy, Oct 26th 1874."



Who was Brother Martin and what was the incident that led to his being presented with such a large sum of money for the time? Had there been a death in the family. Was that why the money was given in sympathy?

A little time spent on Google revealed that 'AOF' was likely to be the Ancient Order of Foresters, an organization that continues to this day as the Foresters Friendly Society. The AOF provided something like an early form of employment insurance for its members. I emailed the AOF archivist about the purse, but he suggested that the inscription gave

him little to go on and that there was a huge backlog of historical enquiries to process. Undeterred, I kept searching on Google and noticed that the Herefordshire Archive and Records Centre held the AOF membership records for the county from 1870. I emailed and explained about the purse and its inscription. I think I was shopping in Tesco when a received a response telling me that the membership records made no mention of a Brother Martin (they only listed new or recent members) but that a newspaper article had been found that would shed some light on it all. All I had to do was pay £30 online to read it! Well, it wasn't 30 sovereigns, so I duly paid up.

The article was a revelation! It was from the Hereford Times of 31st October 1874. It spoke of a meeting at the Old Harp Hotel, Hereford, on 27th October 1874 to witness a presentation of a purse of sovereigns to Brother William Martin (b.1825) from Longhope (a village in Gloucestershire) who, four years ago, whilst working as a foreman platelayer on a railway, had been

severely injured in the eyes by a piece of iron, which sprung from a rail as a workman was cutting it. After staying at the Gloucester Infirmary, he was sent to the Eye Hospital in London where he eventually lost sight in both eyes. The article also mentioned that his wife (his third wife as it turns out) was in delicate health and that their four dependent children looked to him to provide for them. The 30 sovereigns were raised through subscription with the intention of supporting William in a small business that he intended to run (documents available on Ancestry listed him as shopkeeper from then on and later as a peddler). Being able to place William Martin in Gloucestershire in the late 1870s allowed me to successfully trace the Martin family from Longhope back to Newton St Cyres and Winkleigh (both villages in Devon) and from then to St Columb Minor, a tiny village in Cornwall where John Martin, my ten times great grandfather, lived in 1549!

But what of blind William Martin? Well, as previously mentioned, he

was married (and widowed) three times. All three wives are buried in the churchyard at Longhope in Gloucestershire, but sadly there are no markers or monuments to identify the graves. The last we hear of William he was living with his son George in Buckinghamshire in 1911 (then aged 86) but that's where the trail goes cold. We don't know exactly where or when he ended his days (I'm still looking!). But we do have a photo that we believe to be of William with his third wife Jane. Jane's eyes are wide open and looking away into the distance, while William's eyes appear to be closed. Despite his disability (and possibly lowly status), William looks to be a well built and well-dressed man (sporting impressive mutton-chop sideburns).

A recent post-Easter break took us to Cornwall and along the way I managed to find the grave of William's parents in Devon, and I did at least get to visit Longhope on the way back (I'm in the process of writing an article about William for the village website). I hope to visit



again soon to see what's left of the railway where William's accident took place. In the meantime, I'm planning a trip up to St Helen's with my father where William's son, William Henry Martin (1857-1927), lost an eye in a mining accident. Never a dull moment with those Martins!

My adventures in tracing my family history, along with attempts to locate various family graves, really does bring home to me the need to try and maintain our churchyards. It's not an easy thing to do and the financial burden often falls on those who attend Church on a Sunday. Since locating the grave of William's parents (my four times great grandparents) in Devon, I intend to make an annual contribution to the upkeep of the churchyard there. I want the grave to be available for my children and grandchildren to visit and I would like to assist the local congregation in making that possible. If you have a family grave in any of our churchyards, might I encourage you to consider doing the same? Maintaining these precious monuments is a shared responsibility and we all need to play our part.

Election of Officials: Cllr Stephenson was elected as Chair and Cllr Brown as Vice-Chair.

Chairman's remarks – Cllr Stephenson welcomed everyone present and thanked Jeremy Dawson and Simon Lawton for all they had done during their time on the council. He also reported that Mr Lawton would continue to complete the projects started during his time on the council.

Co-option of Councillor: Action is being taken to co-opt a 5th councillor. **Apologies for absence** – C.Cllr Reid.

Defibrillators: Cllr Renner has contacted the residents at Lound and confirmed that they are happy to pay the small cost of electric supply to the equipment. The council now requires three quotations.

Marquees: Following the damp weather that caused the marquees to be dismantled whilst still damp, Cllr Hartley reported that they were now being dried out. Parish residents were reminded that the marquees are available for their private use – contact Cllr Hartley.

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WITHAM ON THE HILL WI June 2023

The speaker, Jennifer Ishikawa, was born in Cleethorpes, emigrated to New Zealand in 1969, aged 19, worked for the New Zealand government, met a Japanese man, married in Cleethorpes, then spent 35 years working in Japan but now lives in Louth. She surprised everyone by saying the population of Japan is 128million – almost twice that of the UK! Space is at a premium and homes are very small.

Jennifer explained the etiquette of wearing a kimono. The traditional kimono is only worn for special occasions and is usually silk. It is made from a bolt of cloth 4½ yards long, and only 14 inches wide- one size fits all - and surplus is bunched up around the waist. Jennifer showed us the many layers of undergarments – all worn to protect the outer garment and to keep the wearer cool, being made of cotton. The outer garment (kimono) is never washed! Long sleeves and colourful fabric indicate a single lady and shorter

sleeves a married one. Often kimono fabric has symbols like fans or cranes for good luck; and the season dictates the flowers - cherry blossom in spring, chrysanthemums in autumn. The obi, or sash, is very long and tied at the back, with a pad rather like a bustle underneath. It can take up to 2 hours to get dressed in the full outfit, often help is needed! The occasions to wear a kimono are New Year's Day, weddings, funerals (pure black kimono), graduations, tea ceremony or doing ikebana (flower arranging). Very little jewellery is worn – just earrings and a wedding ring. Hair is always tied up, to expose the back of the neck, and decorated with ornaments and flowers. A vukata, a simple cotton kimono, is worn for less formal occasions in the summer. The traditional sandals are very small, have a toe post and are worn with white socks. With the tight dress, and the small shoes Japanese women tend to totter with small steps! Ann Burbidge gave the vote of thanks for a fascinating talk.

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Jane's Seasonal Recipe

My adaptation of a Waitrose recipe! I used spring cabbage from our veg plot, but you could use spinach (stir straight into the tomato sauce) or kale. A nutritious supper dish that contains 3 of your 5-a-day!

Gnocchi with cabbage and roasted red peppers

3 red peppers
2 onions
2 tablespoons olive oil
1 pack of gnocchi
190g jar chilli pesto
400g can chopped tomatoes
1 tablespoon white wine vinegar
2 teaspoons sugar
1 small spring cabbage

Slice peppers and onions. Scatter in a large roasting tin, sprinkle with oil and roast for 30mins at 200°C. Fry the gnocchi in 1 tablespoon oil over a medium heat until lightly browned, about 10mins. In a saucepan heat the pesto, tomatoes, vinegar and sugar. Add finely shredded cabbage to a pan of boiling water and cook for 5 mins. Drain well and add to tomato sauce. Stir in the roasted veg and gnocchi. Serve in bowls with crusty bread.
